Dear Mr. Daly,

Thank you for your application, letter and check for USA\$160 received on February 12th last.

Having checked the Oughaval (i.e. Westport) Roman Catholic records and the other surviving sources for the last century I am returning your check un-cashed as there is not a sufficient volume of records available on your Daly ancestors.

Sources for Westport before the 1850s are limited almost exclusively to church records and gravestone inscriptions. The Oughaval parish records, which you have seen at the LDS, contain marriages from 1823 and baptism from 1845. The Oughaval cemetery contains one 19th century Daly inscription:

O Lord have Mercy on the soul of
John Daly
who departed this life October 28, 1836
aged 56 years
also
--- the soul of Mary Daly alias Sheridan
who departed this life 2nd Nov^r, 1864
aged 73 years
This monument
is erected
by their son
Cornelius S. Daly AD 1865.



Mary Daly, who is mentioned on the above inscription died at Peter Street, Westport aged 72 years. Her death was registered by Honor Slevin, her daughter. She was described on her death record as the widow of a cooper. On the General Valuation of 1855 she is listed as holding property on James Street, Westport.

I regret not having a more positive reply to offer you. Enclosed is your check and a street map of Westport.

Miles Daley in the U.S., Civil War Draft Registrations Records, 1863-1865







JOSEPH JARLETH SLEVIN, Norman Daniel' father was born 4 Apr 1844 in Westport, County Mayo, Ireland (from the family bible belonging to his son James and confirmed on his death certificate) and died Feb 1919 in Pittsburg, PA of tuberculosis (two years after son Charles died of the same disease). He is buried in Allegheny Cemetery, in the same plot as his wife, but without a headstone. Joseph J. Slevin came to the United States about 1865 (per the census and a possible match on immigration papers). He would have been about twenty. Over a million Irish left their country during and after the Irish potato famine (1845-1851) settling throughout the north east coast of America and the mid-west seeking work in the trades (construction, mining, railroads) and establishing their own communities. Conditions were particularly bad in County Mayo, where nearly ninety per cent of the population was dependent on the potato. People were dying and emigrating by the thousands. Joseph was likely one of these migrants.

Joseph Jarleth Slevin married Elizabeth Schrock in 1871; he worked as a railroad clerk. The children of Joseph's son James Cornelius remember family stories, often told in jokingly, that the Slevins were forced to leave Ireland one step ahead of the law: for horse stealing. Oral history from James' granddaughter Margaret suggests that he was not welcome back in Ireland as he was thought to sympathize with the English. It is said that his mother, Hanora (aka Honorah or Nora), and a sister also named Honora came to the US through Belgium for this reason. I couldn't find any records to substantiate this. There are few memories of Joseph Jarleth, as his children didn't speak much about him. Grandchildren recall perceptions that Joseph treated his wife Elizabeth poorly, taking better care of his own mother and sister. He purchased a home for both Honoras in Old Allegheny City (now known as the Northside of Pittsburgh between the Ohio and Allegheny rivers), two-three miles away from his own home and supported them, expecting his own wife and children to make do with less. Joseph Jarleth was relatively successful financially, working as a clerk for the Pennsylvania Railroad, and was able to build the large house at 3908 Howley Street and support his large and extended family. He also apparently was quite the dapper dresser – wearing cravats with a diamond or pearl stickpin and walking with a gold trimmed cane. During the depression these gold bands were sold to raise money. According to his death certificate, Joseph Jarleth Slevin's parents were DANIEL SLEVIN (b: approximately 1814 and d: Feb 1852 in Scotland (per the family bible (unsubstantiated)) and HONORA (Daley) (1816-about 1890). They married 16 Nov 1839 in Tuam Catholic Diocese, Oughaval Parish, County Mayo, Ireland. In 1845 the census has them still living in Ireland. Son Joseph Jarleth Slevin would have been a year old then. It is unclear when his sister HONORA MARY SLEVIN was born. Between various documents there is a 15-year difference. Her death certificate says 1869 (25 years after her brother Joseph's birth), however, this would have been virtually impossible given mother Honora's

age. For now, the best estimate derived from multiple sources is about 1853 in County Mayo, Ireland. Census records indicate she immigrated between 1870-1880. These approximate dates are supported by her grandchildren on the Staley side of the family, who said Honora Slevin lied outrageously about her age all her life.

Honora Mary Slevin would marry John Aloysius Staley, whom she met in Pittsburgh, as he used to live and work just down the street from Honora Slevin's brother Joseph Jarleth. Its likely that they knew each other. The Staleys settled in Columbus OH, near Honora's maternal uncle Dennis Daly, and had a family. All of their children were given traditional Slevin/Daly family names and went on to have families of their own (see ancestry.com). City directories show widow-mother Honora Daly Slevin residing with daughter Honora in Ohio until sometime around 1890 – our estimated death date for Honora Daly Slevin.

Of interest, HONORA DALY's two brothers, Dennis William and Cornelius also immigrated to the US. Dennis came in approximately 1848; he settled in Columbus, OH, and established himself as a grocer, a bar owner and even a popular politician. An old article from 1855 shows him being arrested for the third time for selling alcohol on Sunday, a violation of blue-laws. His Saloon was at 7th and 9th N Front Street, as was his bar/theater "Erin Go Bragh" and the grocery was on 9th N Front. His presence in Columbus likely explains how Honora Slevin Staley and her husband John ended up in Columbus and why her mother (Honora Daly Slevin) spent a lot of time between Pittsburgh and Columbus. Dennis' son Cornelius Frank Daily originally settled in Colorado and was quite prolific; his

descendents helped settle the western US and have rich stories of their own. Honora Daly's other brother Cornelius S. immigrated at the same time and is believed to have settled in the MA area – another trail to chase another time. Clearly, whenever the widow Honora Daly Slevin actually came to the US, she already had family in country.

The head of the County Mayo Daly clan was John Daly. The Oughaval Cemetery in County Mayo contains a 19th century inscription on a monument erected by John's son, Cornelius S. Daly, in 1865 which reads: “O Lord, have mercy on the soul of John Daly who departed this life 28 Oct 1836, aged 56 years, also, the soul of Mary Daly, alias Sheridan, who departed this life 2 Nov 1864, aged 73 years.” The Catholic parish of Oughaval, is now called Westport, in County Mayo, right on the Atlantic Ocean. Records on file in County Mayo indicate that Honora Slevin filed the death report for her mother in 1864, proving the ancestry link.

ELIZABETH SCHROCK, Norman Daniel's mother, was born Oct 1847 in York, PA, and died Mar 1920 in Pittsburgh, PA). We know little about her – she might have been a schoolteacher at some time. Her first marriage to Henry Cook ended shortly after the birth of their first child, as described above. Records of their marriage or his death I could not find. From her death certificate we know that Elizabeth's parents CATHERINE (KATE) BAER and JOSEPH J SCHROCK were Pennsylvania farm people. These names are found spelled (or misspelled) different ways (Swiss, German, Dutch), and were common in PA. Elizabeth's parents were most likely of Swiss (Schrock) and German (Bayer) Lutheran heritage. This “guess” is based on the many Schrock descendents (prevalent and prolific in PA) that can trace their lineage back to the earliest Amish immigrants into the US. We further know that the Slevin clan was Catholic, but that the Slevin children were brought up Protestant by Elizabeth – consistent with her Schrock upbringing.

his fourth year, and Rose was in her second year. They were accompanied by five members of the Mooney family, viz., Patrick—father of Mary Sheridan—and his four sons, Hugh, Philip, John and Patrick. There is no mention of Rose, wife of Patrick Mooney and mother of Mary Sheridan: most probably she was dead before 1830. The tenth member of the party was Michael Halpin, or Halfpenny, a nephew of John Sheridan, being the son of his sister Mary Anne. This Michael Halpin, who persuaded his parents to allow him go to America with the Sheridans, was then a boy of sixteen, and continued to reside for some years afterwards with the Sheridans in America.

During the long voyage of seven weeks two members of the party, little Rose Sheridan, aged two years, and Patrick Mooney, junior (his age has not been ascertained), died of cholera, and their bodies, wrapped in blankets, were buried at sea. These pathetic incidents made an indelible impression on the memories of the emigrants.

On arrival in America the party proceeded to Albany, where Thomas Gaynor, an uncle of John Sheridan, was living. This appears to have influenced them in settling down, for a short time at least, in Albany. The new Erie Canal was then in course of construction, and this provided work for many Irish emigrants. John Sheridan, with Michael Halpin and the members of the Mooney family, found employment there, and in a roughly constructed house on the Hudson River, near Albany, the first Sheridan home in America was established. But their residence there was not for long. About a year and a half later they transferred to Somerset, Perry County, Ohio, which became the permanent home of the family. At Somerset were born the three younger children of the family, Mary, John L., and Michael V. That Philip Henry was born at Albany six months after the arrival of the family from Ireland, and was in his first year when taken to Somerset, is the tradition which is preserved by his relatives in America—but there is no documentary evidence available either to support or disprove it. It was at Somerset that he was educated, attending the village

I don't know if this will help you or not, but I can give you the descendants of John Sheridan, the General's father. John's father was named Jack (John?) Sheridan. His wife was a Gaynor (sic). They had six children, John, Patrick, Philip, Michael, Catherine and Mary Anne. I have no information on the last five, but I have a great deal of information about John's descendants. John Sheridan was born in Beagh, Killinkere, County Cavan, Ireland on November 17, 1801. He married Mary Meenagh on her 25th birthday, April 10, 1826, in County Cavan. John and Mary came to the United States in 1831. I have tried to research which port they may have landed at, but to no avail. John became somewhat of a success as a labor contractor for the National Road that was under construction at the time. That success allowed him to build a nice home in Somerset, Ohio, sometimes referred to as the "Steamboat Gothic" style, with a lot of fine detailing on the exterior. John and Mary had six children - Patrick, Rosa, Philip Henry, Mary, John L. and Michael Vincent. Patrick was born in Ireland on April 10, 1828, his mother's 27th birthday. He came to the States with his family, finally settling in Somerset. Patrick died at age 23. He was never married and had no children. Rosa was also born in Ireland in 1829. She died in 1831 on the voyage to America. This information is from the family Bible.
- Philip Henry Sheridan's birthplace has long been argued. The date of his birth was March 6, 1831. That date is important, as you'll note from Rosa's date of death, as it tells a little about Philip's place of birth. As I did my research to write his biography, I covered all the as to where he was born, as reported by others over the years. There is no record in Philadelphia of any Sheridan's taking the oath of allegiance at the time they would have arrived in America. I checked the records in Ireland, but there were no birth records for the years prior to 1864. Baptism records were kept from 1766, but the 50 years prior to 1840 had been lost. The General wrote in his Memoirs that he was born in Albany, New York. A careful check of the baptismal records at St. Mary's Church (the only Catholic Church in Albany at that time) failed to turn up any record of his Baptism there. During the last three years of her life, his niece, Nellie Sheridan Wilson, lived with us. Nellie often told me of the General's exploits, before her death in 1947. She regularly mentioned that "Uncle Phil" was born at sea during the voyage to America, shortly after Rosa's death. That is what I accept as fact. Also the family story is that Mary Meenagh Sheridan was a feisty little thing, and they had to leave Ireland in a hurry after she argued with and may have killed an Orangeman (Protestant). Mary was born in Somerset on June 4, 1834. She married a John Wilson on August 16, 1863, but died on January 24, 1868. They had no children.

- John L. Sheridan was born in Somerset on April 1, 1837. He married Sarah Catherine (Kate) Gallin (my great aunt) on October 11, 1866. They had two children, Mary, born March 11, 1868, and Nellie born December 14, 1870. John was admitted to the bar in 1866. He served many positions in government payroll as the west was settled, including various land offices and the government's agent at Fort Supply in Indian Territory. He was active in politics, and was one of the speakers at the Republican in Ohio in 1868, and was Republican candidate for State Senator from Perry County the same year. He was said to be a candidate for the first Governor of Oklahoma as that territory was becoming a state. John was a large man, with a 54 inch waist. At his daughter Nellie's home, a door leading to the sitting room had to be enlarged to admit his large bulk. John died on June 17, 1898. Kate died in 1911 in Somerset. Michael Vincent Sheridan was born in Somerset on May 24, 1840. He married Margaret (Maggie) Rhey in Chicago on May 27, 1873. "Uncle Mike" (per Nellie) joined the Army on July 1, 1862, as an aide to his brother. He was with the General throughout the Civil War. He was honorably discharged on August 1, 1866, with a breveted (honorary) rank of Brigadier General. He received a commission of Second Lieutenant in the peace time army, based with the 5th Cavalry. In 1867 he was promoted to Captain of the 7th Cavalry. That same year he was posted as an Aide to his brother, serving him until Phil's death in 1888. He served as Brigadier General of Volunteers during the Spanish-American War, and retired at that rank in 1902, after 40 years in the Army. Mike and Maggie had no children. Mike died in Washington on February 21, 1918, and is buried in the family plot in the Arlington National Cemetery.

Philip III was raised in Santa Barbara, California after his father died and his mother remarried. It was there that he took his first flying lessons. He often declared that he had no aspirations for the military, but when World War II broke out, he did join the Army Air Force. He flew 76 missions over Europe as a pilot of a B-26 bomber. He married Adelaide Delamater Soles on March 28, 1941. They had no children. His war experiences may have been the reason for his suicide, when he jumped off the Golden Gate Bridge on March 1948.

Carlina Sheridan lived most of her life near Dartmouth, MA, where she died on December 23, 1982. Her first husband was William Glasgow, whom she married during WWII. He did not return from the war. They had a daughter, Isabel Glasgow. Carlina then married Paul Cleveland McElroy. I have no information regarding Isabel Glasgow.

It's obvious from the above that there are no direct descendants from either the General or his father. Does anyone out there have any information about John Sheridan's siblings or, perhaps, information tying the Gaynors to the Sheridans?

Nellie and Mary Sheridan were my mother's first cousins, although there was some 35 years difference in their ages. My mother was 12 when my grandmother died in 1917, and Nellie and Mary pitched in to help my grandfather cope with the needs of his pubescent daughter. They became very close, and after my mother married, we made the short trip from Columbus to Somerset so she could check on her now aging cousins. As a child I made that trip many times.

"Uncle Mike" (per Nellie) joined the Army on July 1, 1862, as an aide to his brother. He was with the General throughout the Civil War. He was honorably discharged on August 1, 1866, with a breveted (honorary) rank of Brigadier General. He received a commission of Second Lieutenant in the peace time army, based with the 5th Cavalry. In 1867 he was promoted to Captain of the 7th Cavalry. That same year he was posted as an Aide to his brother, serving him until Phil's death in 1888. He served as Brigadier General of Volunteers during the Spanish-American War, and retired at that rank in 1902, after 40 years in the Army. Mike and Maggie had no children. Mike died in Washington on February 21, 1918, and is buried in the family plot in the Arlington National Cemetery. Philip III was raised in Santa Barbara, California after his father died and his mother remarried. It was there that he took his first flying lessons. He often declared that he had no aspirations for the military, but when World War II broke out, he did join the Army Air Force. He flew 76 missions over Europe as a pilot of a B-26 bomber. He married Adelaide Delamater Soles on March 28, 1941. They had no children. His war experiences may have been the reason for his suicide, when he jumped off the Golden Gate Bridge on March 1948.

Carlina Sheridan lived most of her life near Dartmouth, MA, where she died on December 23, 1982. Her first husband was William Glasgow, whom she married during WWII. He did not return from the war. They had a daughter, Isabel Glasgow. Carlina then married Paul Cleveland McElroy. I have no information regarding Isabel Glasgow.

Nellie and Mary Sheridan were my mother's first cousins, although there was some 35 years difference in their ages. My mother was 12 when my grandmother died in 1917, and Nellie and Mary pitched in to help my grandfather cope with the needs of his pubescent daughter. They became very close, and after my mother married, we made the short trip from Columbus to Somerset so she could check on her now aging cousins. As a child I made that trip many times. Since I had no friends in Somerset to play with, I was allowed to go up and play in the steamer trunk on the landing. That trunk held the General's uniforms, some medals, his battle flag and an Indian Peace Pipe. Any ideas why I've become so interested in the General?

GENERAL PHILLIP SHERIDAN



General Sheridan married Irene Rucker in Chicago on June 3, 1875, only a month after his father's death. They had four children - Philip Henry Jr., Mary and twins, Irene and Louise. None of the girls ever married. The General, of course, died on August 5, 1888 in Nonquitt, Massachusetts and is buried in Arlington National Cemetery.

Philip Henry Sheridan, Jr. was born in Chicago on July 28, 1880 and died of diabetes on February 17, 1918, only days before his Uncle Mike. He graduated from West Point in the Class of 1902, a class that included Douglas MacArthur. He was Attache to President Teddy Roosevelt, until he asked to be sent to a more active post in Arizona. He served in various posts in the west and in Hawaii, before being Posted in Washington D.C. When he died, he was a Major in the Army.

Philip married Isabel McGunnege. They had two children, Philip Henry III (born in July, 1916) and Carlina (born March 26, 1914).
